Last Words on My Time in Modesto

As I write this it has been ten days since I finished my time at Modesto. First, let me say thank you to the church for a wonderful send off. I always enjoyed the meals that the fellowship commission put on at Modesto and the luncheon that day was no exception. I appreciated the sharing that was done that day as well and thank everyone for the cards and gifts as well.

I've had some wonderful time to relax, enjoy family and do various other things that I wasn't always able to do while serving as your Interim Pastor, like going out for Sunday brunch. (I probably shouldn't admit doing that, but we are planning to attend worship at La Verne COB this Sunday.) I've also spent a little time in reflecting on my experience with the Modesto Church of the Brethren and I wanted to share a couple of thoughts with you.

Modesto was the seventh Church of the Brethren where I've been very involved with the ministry. My role has been different from church to church, but in each has in some way or another been a rewarding experience.

But Modesto may have been the most rewarding of the seven. I say that in part because of the friendships that were developed during the sixteen months I was there and in part because of the respect and appreciation that I received during my time in Modesto. But mostly I feel that way because I believe that the church is positioned for a bright future because of what we were able to accomplish during that time. I want to offer a few encouragements that I think will help secure that bright future:

- 1. Modesto has a number of very strong ministries (worship, senior ministries, FUN and Faith Bites quickly come to mind), make certain that these things are both maintained and utilized in reaching out to others who are not part of the church.
- 2. Keep the goals from the Vital Ministry Journey in front of you. Begin each year with some sort of evaluation of them, celebrating progresses made and setting goals for the coming year.
- 3. Strive to grow ministries that involve young adults, especially seeking ways to bring them into leadership positions.
- 4. Add more opportunities for Bible study and other types of Spiritual growth. Modesto is a progressive church and one of the mistakes progressive churches sometimes make is to think that the Bible is only for conservatives.

Look for studies by progressives, but also study some evangelical studies by people like N.T. Wright to help broaden your prospective.

5. Look for ways to take the church out into the community. Traditionally churches have focused on inviting people to come to church, but Jesus sent his disciples into the world. Ask the question, what would it look like to send missionaries to Modesto?

6. Consider implementing a new operating structure. The present system of Church Board and commissions is probably a little too cumbersome for our current culture. Like businesses today, a streamlined model with more flexibility will probably make ministry more effective.

7. Lastly, but maybe most importantly, be bold and imaginative in the creation of new ministries. If everything you do is successful, you're not trying enough new things.

I believe that Modesto Church of the Brethren has all the resources necessary to accomplish all this and much more, my hope and prayers are that you'll also have the will to do so as well. If I can assist from the sidelines until a new pastor (either interim or settled) is called, I'd be happy to do so.

Again, I am so very grateful to you for making my time there so very, very meaningful and look forward to maintaining a relationship with you in whatever ways that can happen in the future, so let me know if you're heading to the Palm Springs area for Coachella, the PGA tournament, the film festival or any other reason. And if you need to rent a car while you're here, I can probably help you out with that as well.
