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NEW LIFE, ARE YOU FEELING IT? By Felton Daniels

I will paraphrase a story from the Bible that you probably have never heard. I am paraphrasing Acts 1:13-16, and 21-26. After Jesus had ascended into heaven the followers, about 120 in all, returned to Jerusalem and the upper room where they had been staying for some time. A few days after they returned, during a meeting, Peter stood and said they should fill the position left by Judas in order to carry Jesus' message to as many as possible. Peter led them in a process to elect from the group of men that had been with Jesus through his whole ministry "a person that really knew him" to replace Judas.

Two men were nominated from that group, Matthias and Barsabbas.

The group prayed to the Lord saying he knew the hearts of these two men. They asked the Lord to give them an indication as to which one he would choose if he were there. They drew lots and the lot fell to Matthias. Taking that as a sign from the Lord, Matthias became the thirteenth disciple.

There is no other information in the Bible about Matthias. We do not know where or how well he worked.

Lloyd J. Ogilvie, General Editor of <u>The</u> <u>Communicator's Commentary</u> on <u>Acts</u>, indicates that Luke would have undoubtedly reported work that was unusual.

What does this story of Matthias, the new disciple, have to do with our sermon today? This was the time of the formation of the Church of Christ. It was no longer a group walking with Christ. This was new. It was now a group trying to follow what Christ had been teaching and working to teach others. And, Matthias was the first leader elected in this NEW organization. In a real sense everything was new! Matthias' election symbolizes the change from the work with Jesus to the work of the new organization without Jesus.

Before we leave this story about Matthias I want to share with you one other "New Life" story related to Matthias. I became interested in the name Matthias when I learned my grandfather on my mother's side, 6 times back, was named Matthias Gisch. Matthias Gisch in 1733, along with his family, crossed the Atlantic with Johannes Naas, a leader in the Brethren movement. They were among the last Brethren to leave Germany to come to America. All Brethren on that ship, The Pennsylvania Merchant, traveled all that distance to start a "new life" for themselves, in a new country, free of religious persecution.

Pastor Andrew is coming soon with his <u>new</u> look at our congregation, his <u>new</u> ideas, his <u>new</u> personality, at least to us. He will surely present ideas for new programs or give old ones a new twist. But, his coming will change us too. I learned in my Social Work classes that the addition of one person in a group changes the group and everyone in it. So, in a real sense our congregation will be <u>new</u>.

I worry that when he comes we will relax and expect him to do all of the work of the church. Although things will be new, it is my hope that we will remain as involved as we have been this past two years.

New things are being talked about even now before Andrew arrives. We have a new postcard that we have sent out to people in this neighborhood. The youth group will soon be divided into two groups one for junior high and the other for high school. And that is new. There is talk of walking the neighborhood and meeting our neighbors. And that is new.

Going back to the time Jesus was teaching: I have been told that there were others in Jesus time that did miracles and prophesied. Then why Jesus? Why aren't we worshipping some other speaker from that era? What made the difference? Was it the organization? After all Jesus called the twelve disciples and there were at least 120 involved as followers as well. Maybe it was the organization that made the difference.

Or was it?

What did make the difference?

I think it was Jesus message <u>about</u> God that made the difference.

But, what about God?

Jesus message about God was in a "new" way. The message was about a merciful God. A God of grace. A God of hope. A God of the second chance. A God for the individual. The story of Easter. You can have New Life! You can have hope! You can have a new beginning! NEW LIFE, ARE YOU FEELING IT?

It is a message that transcends organization, although the early church does appear to be well organized as we already have discussed. We also know that we humans need organization to carry out our work effectively.

It is a message that speaks to each of us. It is a very personal message. It is a message for everyone. Every one of us is a child of God. The rich, the poor. The educated, the ignorant. The sick, the well. The gay, the straight. The powerful, the weak. The politician, the voter. The married, the single, the widowed.


The New Testament has many stories of the people Jesus reached out to. Some of these include the innocent - the children. those with handicaps - the blind, those with the lowest status of society - the prostitute, the most feared - the leper, those least respected -the tax collector. Linda read us this story, where Jesus invited the tax collector to sit and eat with him for he too was one of God's children. Jesus' message is a message of "New Life" to all. It is the Easter story. It is Christ's story about God. And I believe as near as I can tell that message was new in that world at that time. And I believe it is a message to be heard as "new" by many people in our world today.

We, I, you, are all important in this message from Jesus about God. But I think there is more. When I read and hear about Jesus' teachings I think he was saying that not only are we important, we are able to make ourselves "new"!

It is a message of how we might live our life. Or how we might change our life. It is a message of how we might see ourselves being. Are we able to feel forgiven and move on to a better day as Eddie talked about a few weeks ago? Are we able to forgive others? Do we lie or tell the truth? Is it hard to accept others? Can my skills be improved? Can I take on more responsibility? Are you moving from self to service to others? Are you ready for new adventures? Are you staying vital? It has been said that attitude is everything. Does your attitude need adjusting? You have the power to adjust it! You have the power within you to live a richer, healthier, happier life.

You see, I think we will experience new life in our church organization with the coming of our new minister and with the new programs we help to create. And I am looking forward to that as I am sure you are too. But, I think the real message of New Life was present a few Sundays ago when we celebrated Easter. And that is the promise of hope, of grace, a promise of the second chance. The idea of being able to change our lives for the better, that is the Easter story, the story of our loving God, and one that Jesus taught over and over again while he was here on earth.

To separate the Treasurer/Bookkeeper position into two positions. This would provide two sets of eyes on all financial transactions. **Explanation:**


Treasurer: The Treasurer would be an Ex-Officio elected member of the Board and the Stewardship Commission. The Treasurer would sign checks, and report all financial transactions to the Board and Council Bookkeeper: The Bookkeeper would be a paid position and keep a book of accounts, receive the financial secretary's deposit slips, disburse funds by preparing checks for the Treasurer's signature, make written reports of all financial transactions and submit accounts to an annual audit.

If Council votes this structure change, the change in the Bylaws would go to Council in November for a vote; a Treasurer would be nominated for vote in November and the change would take place in January 2020.
