#### Autumn in Modesto

It is officially autumn in Modesto. No, we don't have colorful leaves on the many trees lining the streets-not yet. The color will come, probably in November. We don't have frosty nights-not yet. There are still roses on our bushes; our tomato vines still give us fruit. My tropical hibiscuses are still blooming. We still need to mow the lawn. Afternoons are still warm enough for shorts and sandals.

But we can no longer go for walks after dinner unless we take a jacket and a flashlight. It's too chilly in the evening to enjoy sitting out on the patio. It's dark in the morning when it's time to get up, and dark soon after dinner. Many of our waking hours are in the dark.

Autumn's growing darkness used to bring on darkness in my mood. I never looked forward to the months between October to the middle of January. Foggy, sunless days would depress me so much that I needed to drive up into the mountains, above the blanket of gray that covered the valley, to Sunshine Road, just north of Sonora, where the sun would break through the fog. I needed to see a little bit of sun.

Even the winter holidays didn't give me any joy. It wasn't until around my birthday in January that the gloom would lift--both from the weather and from my frame of mind.

Sometime in the last decade I learned about seasonal affective disorder, and recognized the symptoms in myself. Sitting under bright light first thing in the morning has helped. I now don't dread autumn. I can now enjoy the crisp, chilly air in the morning, the beautiful leaves on the ginkgo and Chinese pistache trees in my neighborhood, and look forward to winter holidays. Autumn's beauty is now a joy to me, as are the many Bible verses that speak of light in the darkness, such as John 8:12 "I am the light of the world. He who follows Me shall not walk in darkness, but have the light of life."

We have been setting aside approximately \$20,000 per year from funds that formerly paid the electric bill, to repay the loans from church members that funded the installation of the solar panels. In 4 more years, the solar loans will be paid off and the \$20,000 per year set aside to pay the loans will drop out of the building and grounds budget.

In a little more than 4 years we will be looking at monthly electrical bills of \$150 or less per month vs. \$1500 per month in the past. These savings should continue for the life of our solar panels, which have a life expectancy of 30 to 40 years. Installing solar panels and converting to LED lights have had a major impact on the church budget.

## Terrific Fall Workday!

Our fall All Church Work Day was terrific. Good weather, good turnout and good food to end the work day. A lot was done. We again got the chance to clean and shine the solar panels, and spruce up the lines and arrows in the parking lot. Some interior lights got changed and trash cans in the kitchen got scrubbed. Toys in the nursery got their biannual cleaning. Some windows got a spot cleaning. The rain gutters were blown out getting ready for the rain to come. The stumps from our spring work day were ground down and loose logs that were still remaining were picked up and moved so that the city could pick them up. The large green weeds—those trying to become trees—were pruned at the ground level in anticipation of the field being mowed in December/January.



## DOES SOLAR POWER WORK FOR THE CHURCH?

In the process of working on the 2020 church budget a few numbers came jumping off the page that I would like to share.

Almost 6 years ago we installed our solar panels and locked in our electrical expense as well as taking advantage of generous rebates available at the time. Our pre-solar monthly electrical bill ran about \$1500 a month. Doing the budget for 2020 I found that in 2019 our average actual monthly electrical payment to MID has been about \$152 per month, due to the move to solar panels, as well as the conversion of our church lighting to LED.

After mowing we are going to have a preemergent (that prevents weed seeds from sprouting) applied to the field and sometime in April or May have a post-emergent weed killer applied by our landscaping company. We anticipate that this process will be done annually. Now that the old mistletoe ridden trees have been taken out, new holes were dug for a new variety of trees to be planted in the next week or so.

These were a lot of "little projects" that could not be done without a bunch of helpful arms and legs from our volunteers. Thanks again to this super group. ~Bill Johnson

Janeen Studley wrote a poem, "Diamonds and Gold" which was reprinted in the last Chimes. She wrote this in memory of her Mom on her last Mother's Day before her death. She had been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease.

However, the only way to conclusively determine if it was Alzheimer's is an autopsy. Dementia is the loss of intellectual abilities interfering with a person's social and occupational functions. Other causes are brain injuries, brain tumors, and vascular disorders. Any form of dementia could lead into Alzheimer's.

In Janeen's case, the neurologist believes that her cognitive impairment is due to concussions. Just like many others, she is walking the journey even though the path is unknown.

Janeen will be discussing more on the topic on **October 17th at 12 pm**. She will be talking about her experiences and journey thus far. This discussion is a way to show you, your loved ones, and friends that you are not alone on your journey.

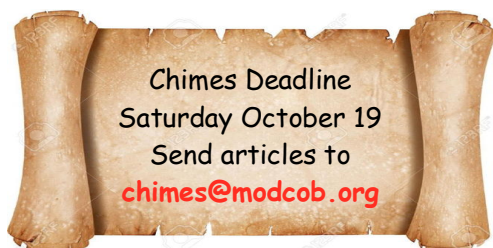
