Chick, chick, chicks, and more chicks!
During Lent this year, the Witness
Commission and the Christian Education
Commission are sponsoring an outreach
project to benefit the hungry people around
the world who receive flocks of chicks
through Heifer International.

A flock of 20-40 chicks costs \$20. As the chicks grow, the family who receives them will have eggs to eat and sell. A hen can lay as many as 200 eggs a year, providing protein, vitamins and income. Some eggs might hatch and provide more chicks! Chickens are easy to care for and don't take up much space. The families who receive a flock of chicks improve their health and income, thanks to the eggs they get from their flocks.

Please consider helping to fill the Easter basket in the front of the sanctuary during the offering. Parents are encouraged to give their children tasks to do for which they are paid, so they can put money for chicks in the basket also. The donations for chicks will be kept track of on a board in the narthex. So please, fill the Easter Basket for chicks!

Council Meeting March 15th

The Moderator and the Board have called a special Council meeting for Sunday, March 15th immediately following church and will consider one item of business: Changing the requirement for a quorum at our Council meetings from fifty to thirty-five. We were not able to vote at the last Council meeting because we did not have a constitutionally valid quorum and there have been other times when we could not hold the meeting because not enough members were present for a quorum. We would like to lower the number to more closely represent the members that are attending.

AMENDMENT TO: <u>ARTICLE V.</u> <u>CONGREGATIONAL BUSINESS MEETING</u> (COUNCIL)

E. Quorum: Although it is desirable to have as many persons present as possible for the Council, a minimum of fifty, or ten percent of the membership, whichever is higher, shall be required in order to conduct business.

Change to the following:

E. Quorum: Although it is desirable to have as many persons present as possible for the Council, a minimum of <u>thirty-five</u>, or <u>twenty percent</u> of the membership, whichever is <u>lower</u>, shall be required in order to conduct business.

The wording and numbers that we used in the Amendment were used on the advice of the legal counsel for the Pacific Southwest District. In order for this Amendment to pass we will have to have at least 50 members present to vote. So please put the date on your calendar and come to church on Sunday, March 15^{th} .

Some Helpful Information to Share with My Brothers and Sisters (Abridged from an article by James Robb, MD FCAP; sent by Carole Greathouse)

(The entirety of Dr. Robb's article is available in several places on the internet. Just search for the doctor's name.)

"As some of you may recall, when I was a professor of pathology at the University of California San Diego, I was one of the first molecular virologists in the world to work on coronaviruses (the 1970s). I was the first to demonstrate the number of genes the virus contained. Since then, I have kept up with the coronavirus field and its multiple clinical transfers into the human population (e.g., SARS, MERS), from different animal sources....

"Here is what I have done and the precautions that I take and will take. These are the same precautions I currently use during our influenza seasons.

- 1) NO HANDSHAKING! Use a fist bump, slight bow, elbow bump, etc.
- 2) Use ONLY your knuckle to touch light switches. elevator buttons, etc. Lift the gasoline dispenser with a paper towel or use a disposable glove.

- 3) Open doors with your closed fist or hip do not grasp the handle with your hand, unless there is no other way to open the door. Especially important on bathroom and post office/commercial doors.
- 4) Use disinfectant wipes at the stores when they are available, including wiping the handle and child seat in grocery carts.
- 5) Wash your hands with soap for 10-20 seconds and/or use a greater than 60% alcohol-based hand sanitizer whenever you return home from ANY activity that involves locations where other people have been.
- 6) Keep a bottle of sanitizer available at each of your home's entrances. AND in your car for use after getting gas or touching other contaminated objects when you can't immediately wash your hands.
- 7) If possible, cough or sneeze into a disposable tissue and discard. Use your elbow only if you have to. The clothing on your elbow will contain infectious virus that can be passed on for up to a week or more!" ~By James Robb, MD, FCAP

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT PROJECT EVENT AT MJC WEST CAMPUS

Richard Rothstein Lecture Wednesday March 25, 7-9 pm in the Mary Stuart Rogers Building (West Campus)

Richard Rothstein is a distinguished fellow at the Economic Policy Institute and a fellow at the Thurgood Marshall Institute of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund. He resides in California, where he is a fellow of the Haas Institute at the University of California, Berkeley. His book *The Color of Law* was nominated for a National Book Award for best nonfiction book in 2017.

In The Color of Law: A Forgotten History of How Our Government Segregated America, Richard Rothstein focuses on mid-twentieth century government policy that was used to enforce residential racial segregation. His research suggests that many inequities African Americans face today are the result of this history of injustice. According to Rothstein, "The core argument of [my] book is that African Americans were unconstitutionally denied the means and the right to integration in middle-class neighborhoods, and because this denial was state-sponsored, the nation is obligated to remedy it."

Following the lecture will be a Q & A session with Rothstein and a panel of invited guests: local activists Dave and Sharon Froba and the NAACP President of Stanislaus County, Wendy Byrd.
