Many of us remember being fortunate enough to have heard John Lewis speak in person at the yearly Martin Luther King Jr. Commemoration several years ago.

John Lewis, one of the youngest to become part of the nonviolent civil rights movement, dedicated his life to promoting civil rights for all, and to opposing systemic racism. In that effort, he was beaten and arrested several times. In 1987, he was elected to Congress and continued working for equity until his death on July 17.


Here are some examples of John Lewis' wisdom:

"When you see something that is not right, not fair, not just, you have to speak up. You have to say something; you have to do something."

"Get in good trouble, necessary trouble, and help redeem the soul of America."

"You are a light. You are the light. Never let anyone — any person or any force — dampen, dim or diminish your light...Release the need to hate, to harbor division, and the enticement of revenge. Release all bitterness. Hold only love, only peace in your heart, knowing that the battle of good to overcome evil is already won."


Evan Campbell asks for prayers for school districts across the nation as they make difficult decisions regarding the start of school.

- Responsibly advocate for religious practices and policies that support democratic visions and an inclusive society.
- Intentionally connect our experiences of injustice with other forms of social discrimination and commit ourselves to resist oppression in all its forms.


