However, the beginning of this school year is quite different from years past and everyone involved has done remarkable work in adapting, creating, and implementing the new ways of learning. Our prayers and thoughts go with those who are in the midst of this extraordinary time. The new ways of going to school are unlike anything that most of us have experienced - logging into a computer or tablet along with one's classmates to join a lecture or lesson, not having to ride the bus or in a car to get to school, and almost being able to go to school in one's pajamas. Yet, there are some things that have stayed the same - reading books and writing papers, learning how to write and spell our names, and the teacher giving out a syllabus at the start of class.

Personally, I appreciated the syllabus as it helped me to know what we were going to be doing and when. It provided a look into the future and tied together what sometimes felt like a series of random or unrelated topics. 

On the third Thursday night of each month, from November through April, we provide the evening meal at the 9th and D Street Homeless Shelter which is operated by the Salvation Army for the city of Modesto. It takes many volunteers each time to make this ministry happen. Below are the roles needed each month. Email or call the office to get your name on the list for a specific month. It also takes a large budget to buy this much food!

Shoppers

When cooking for 140 people it takes a lot of groceries! The lead coordinator will develop a menu and a list of ingredients needed to make the meal. We are then looking for individuals to get the groceries and safely transport them back to the church a day or two beforehand. Grocery expenses are paid for by the church.

Kitchen Help

In the midst of the pandemic the meal is prepared at the church. We need 3 to 4 volunteers to work in the church kitchen to help cook the meal. A lead cook is in place, if you can chop, stir, wash, and mix, we can train you for the rest. Once we can safely return; the meal will be prepared and cooked at the shelter. This helps to decrease clean-up and transportation times.



Desserts

A volunteer or two prepares dessert for 140 people and needs to have it at the church by 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday of meal preparation. Ideal desserts include cookies, brownies, cupcakes, items that can easily be served without a lot of work. Homemade desserts are a real treat!

Serving Help

During the pandemic we are not serving the meal, but we can use 2-3 vehicles to transport it safely to the shelter. Directions on how this is done will be provided to the drivers. However, once we can safely enter the facility, we will need people to serve the meal.

Volunteers do not need to be of a certain age or experience level to help! The only age requirement is that drivers must have a license to do so. Excluding shopping it takes 3-4 hours from start to finish to prepare, cook and serve a meal for 140 people. Volunteers also may have a meal if they would like. It is a fun time to interact with your church family and meet new people.
