Last week, I gathered with Kim Boardman, Bill Johnson, Marye Martinez, Jim Costello, and Allison Sampson along with input from Linda Hunter to continue the conversation about the safety and well-being of the congregation, the state of the pandemic, and finding a collective way forward. This has been the overall purpose of this group since I called them and Karen Cosner at the beginning of the Covid pandemic, and I want to express my gratitude to them for their individual and collective wisdom, guidance, and insight. We had a purpose, lots of questions and concerns, but little idea of how long this situation would last and with minimal direction from the denomination. However, we met many times over the past 13+ months trying to stay abreast of the situation, navigate as best that we could, and now we are beginning to see that the end is near!

Therefore, we would like to invite you to in-person worship in the sanctuary at 11:00 on May 2, 2021. The service will also be live streamed to the church's Facebook page, www.facebook.com/modcob, and later uploaded to YouTube and emailed to the church email list. If attending in person, please respect the following guidelines for your well-being and the health of the congregation.

- We highly recommend that you receive the vaccine and that you do so for your own safety and wellbeing and for the safety of others.
- Join us online if you are not feeling well.
- The doors will open at 10:45 so please enjoy your coffee at home as we will not be serving any before (or after) the service.
- Wear a mask that covers your nose <u>and</u> mouth. We will have extras in case you forget yours.
- Use only the front doors for entering and exiting the church - even if you have a key.

- Have your temperature checked and then sanitize your hands before entering the sanctuary. Don't worry!
 We will wait for you.
- There are tables especially for the families of our youngest friends as we will not have childcare until further notice.
- Keep a 6' distance from those not living at your address.
- In accordance with health guidelines, we will have a limit of 75 people which is 25% of the sanctuary's capacity.
- Leave after the worship service ends, and don't get stuck in the back of the line at one of the many delicious, local restaurants.

We appreciate the kindness and thoughtfulness that you have shown over the past year, and we pray that you continue to bear with us as we still face an unknown future. There will be more changes to come. Some will come quickly, and others require more time and consideration before they are achieved more fully. We ask for your prayers and participation as we faithfully venture forward.

Only the front doors will open at 10:45. Please stop to have your temperature checked and sanitize your hands. Don't worry you won't miss worship!





Use "hellos," bows, and other non-touch greetings

We will not be having a coffee or snack time before or after the worship service. In accordance with health

guidelines, capacity for worship will be 75 (25% of the capacity)

LABYRINTH SIGN PROPOSAL

It's hard to believe that our beautiful labyrinth has been around for almost 6 years. During that time, there has been talk about having a labyrinth sign there, not only from folks in our congregation but also from some of our neighbors.

Finally, the Worship & Spiritual Life Commission decided to take up the challenge this year. We came up with a design for a handicapped accessible 'welcome' sign which includes background information on labyrinths and an explanation of various ways to walk the prayerful path. Next to this article is an artist's rendering of the proposed sign from City Signs. It's made of durable aluminum and angled like a podium on a single pole. Monies remaining in the labyrinth beautification fund are available to pay for it.

The WSL Commission is recommending approval of the sign at the May 10 board meeting. Feel free to share your comments with our commission or the board.

The labyrinth design is an ancient form found in many cultures worldwide.

Its imagery combines a circle & spiral into a meandering but purposeful path.

People walk them as a pilgrimage of prayer, a time to ponder a conflict, or simply to quiet the chatter in one's mind in a complex & uncertain world. The path represents a journey into your center and back out into the world. Unlike a maze, a labyrinth has only one circuitous path, so you can't get lost.


PREPARING

- The labyrinth garden is sacred ground. Notice the natural beauty around you.
- As you take some deep breaths, open your heart to your thoughts & feelings.
- · Walking the labyrinth as a spiritual practice provides opportunity for renewal.
- May you find peace and healing as you walk along this pathway in silence.
- Upon entering, leave the world behind as you take a journey into your center.

WALKING

- As you walk, you may want to ponder a specific question or address a concern.
- Another option is to pick up a small stone symbolizing a burden that you carry.
- Upon reaching the center rock, pause, pray or reflect on your unique journey.
- When ready, leave your stone there to symbolize leaving your burden behind.
- Follow the path outward & reflect on your journey as you return to the world.

Go in peace, as bearers of peace into the world.
